Marrakech

Marrakech has stood for close to a thousand years, a city of history and culture. One of the most evocative places in the world, just the name conjures up images of this cultural melting pot – sandstone buildings, dusty streets and towering minarets against deep blue skies immediately spring to mind. Known as The Red City thanks to the hue of the thick walls surrounding the old city, Marrakech has been a popular tourist destination in Morocco since the 1960s, attracting everyone from the Beatles to Sienna Miller. It's a place to engage the senses, nowhere more so than in the famous souks.

These vibrant markets are a whirlwind of colour and noise, where throngs of people weave between tightly packed stalls exhibiting pyramids of brightly coloured spices, richly woven rugs and a thousand other exotic goods. Enticing smells waft through the souks, and the clamour of voices haggling and the cries of vendors competing for customers provides a constant backing track to the city. It's almost impossible to walk through Marrakech for more than five minutes without finding some architectural wonder to marvel at. From the exquisite gardens to the intricately carved archways to the ornate mosques, this is a city that displays its history in its man-made environment. The Medina in particular is a sight to behold: designated a UNESCO World Heritage Centre it's a wonderful mix of Amazigh, Arabic and Moorish architecture. When it comes to entertainment. Marrakech blends cultures to magical effect. Jemaa El-Fnaa is the busiest square in the whole of Africa, packed with fireeaters, cross-dressing bellydancers, Amazigh acrobats, astrologers, and a hundred other types of street entertainers. Marrakech also plays host to many festivals such as the Dakka Marrakchia, the Popular Arts Festival and the Marrakech Biennale. A more relaxed time can be had on one of Marrakech's fine golf courses, or for a delightful pampering experience then seek out one of the many hammams that are a speciality of the city

JMAA EL FNA,

Jamaa el Fna is at the heart of the Medina, and serves as a main square. Stop here for lunch, as restaurants rule the scenery, and various foods and fare are up for the tasting. Sweet cakes and ginseng teas sold at stalls make for a wonderful after-meal dessert, and rooftop restaurants and terraced stalls offer equally tasty treats. So sit down to enjoy the amazing view a meal, or just a coffee or tea among the snake charmers and storytellers of Jemaa el Fna.



THE KOUTOUBIA MOSQUE

The Koutoubia Mosque, the largest Mosque in Marrakech, is a stunning sight by night or day. While it is floodlit by nightfall, by day its arching windows, beautiful gardens, burbling fountains, and stony facade can be appreciated to the fullest extent. Its minaret stands at over 250 feet tall, and can be seen from almost anywhere in Marrakech, leading the way to the Medina, and proving an architectural wonder. A short stroll around the Mosque and its surroundings is a refreshing and leisurely way to take in one of the city's most important structures.



MEDINA OF MARRAKECH

A short walk from the Jardin Majorelle, the Medina of Marrakech is one of the city's biggest draws and the grandest of all Berber marketplaces in Morocco. A swarming center of commerce, the souks at the Medina sell goods ranging from carpets to leathers, pottery to jewels, lanterns to spices, and more. Plus, snakes, monkeys, and donkeys with laden carts are added to the mix of traffic. Visit to have a mint tea, browse traditional wares and food, and soak up the colorful stalls and surrounding architecture. And do not forget to enjoy the Magrib from the terrace of Cafe de France, with the sunset at the end is an amazing experience.

SAADIAN TOMBS

Situated behind the Kasbah Mosque, the Saadian Tombs hail from the 16th century and were returned to their former glory and beauty after being re-discovered in the early 1900s. The mausoleum contains the intricate burials of over fifty members of Saadi Dynastic royalty, as well as an attractive garden area containing the grave sites of servants and soldiers. The highlight of the mosaic masterpiece is in one of the central three rooms, where the sultan's grandson Ahmad al-Mansur is buried. Columns raise the roof high above the marble detailing and cedar steel, a true monument not to be missed.





BEN YOUSSEF MADRASA

The Ben Youssef Madrasa functioned as a theological college throughout the 14th century and into the 1960s. Today, its halls, classrooms, courtyard, and dorms — decorated in gorgeous geometric and floral patterns of cedar, stucco, and marble — welcome visitors. A quiet, shaded place to rest and take in Morocco's scholarly and religious past, and to feel what it must have been like to learn in this venerable space.

AUTHENTIQUE, INSOLITE, CONFIDENTIEL

The largest terrace of the Medina's golden triangle is welcoming and opens out with panache over 1800 sm. The view is splendid at 360°! It overlooks the Saadian tombs and the Kasbah's great mosque and the Koutoubia, dominates the quarter's small picturesque and colourful market, close to a lucky stork nest, and spans the majestic ochre city and Atlas Mountains on the horizon.

Marrakech

The philosophy of the hotel reveals itself in the spirit of the place.

The fuzzy feeling, but palpable that you feel makes the place unique. It can not be compared to any other. Even during a short stay at the Sultana Marrakech, we feel that impression. Because everything was done to create harmony in an extraordinary place with such skill that everything seems to have always existed and it provides a sense of timelessness and eternity.

Located in UNESCO listed Medina world heritage site, La Sultana Marrakech own history that echoes to Moroccan great Royal History. Once upon a time in the days of the Almohad dynasty (12th century), where La Sultana Marrakech is today, a granary supplies the royal family and the court of the Calife Yacoub El Mansour. The Calife just completed the Koutoubia and plans to add a Royal Kasbah to the city with access through the Bab Agnaou archway.

As a nod to this granary and the brick usage at that time, La Sultana Marrakech used the brick as the main material in the architecture of the Almohad patio.

TABLEAUX ET OEUVRES D'ART

The art objects shines at La Sultana 'Marrakech', sculptures, antiques, furnitures, paintings..., carefully put in display to amaze the eye. Over the years the private collection was enriched with paintings by famous Moroccan artists such as Gharbaoui, Louardiri, Denmati, Hassan El Glaoui, Mohamed Ben Allal... And Middle Eastern such us José-Cruz Herrera, Odette Bruno, Pontoy, Brunet Ouard...



In the 16th century, Marrakech undergo notable architectural achievements near La Sultana, under the Saadian rulers (1510-1669) when the El Badi Palace and the Saadian tombs were built. This dynasty has been a source of inspiration at large at La Sultana Marrakech with similar Moorish design in tiles patterns of the Saadian patio and white plaster work.

The Alaouite dynasty takes over in the 18th century with the Sultan Moulay Ismael dismantling the Badi palace to make a greater palace and decided to walled the Saadian tombs to see it fall into obscurity for hundreds of years. The secret remained closely guarded until aerial photography exposed them in 1917. Today this monument is visible from above from the grand rooftop of La Sultana Marrakech.

At the end of the 19th century, the building corresponding to La Sultana Marrakech today was handed down to a former palace worker, Caïd Azzi Boujemaa as a gift for his devotion and loyalty to the dynasty. During the French protectorate, his son lovingly restored many of its original features and the address became synonymous with glamorous society balls and parties with his wife bearing for coquetry a French name Odette. In 2001, in partnership with the Historical Monuments Organisation, it was revived once more to become a place of great hospitality. In its modern day apparel La Sultana captures the charm and elegance of residencies from a bygone era, offering the intimacy of a smaller hotel with unparalleled one-to-one service and experiences. Made-up of five separate riads, it feels maze-like and disguises its sprawling corridors and hidden chambers for the delight of its own guests.

Its introduction, at the beginning of the 7th century, and then from the 11th century from Arabia, coincided with the gradual Islamisation of the country, and is synonymous with peace and civilization. As such, the thoroughbred stands, as much as Moorish architecture, for a golden age of Moroccan culture.

As such, Abdeslam Bennani Smires decided to pay tribute to this horse that has fascinated the world for millennia. It is the horse that has given his name -Selman is the father of a line of thoroughbreds - and its spirit to the hotel. It is of huge significance. Facing the Andalucian pavilion, the Selman stud has two lavish stables which have been designed and decorated by Jacques Garcia as palaces in their own right. In the gardens, five paddocks, fenced with post and rails are home to the Selman horses, bred from the hotel's own breeding program, roaming in their paddocks for the guests' delight. This equine ballet gives meaning and magic to the place. A visitor feels like the guest of honor at an exclusive stud farm whose doors would normally be open to privileged collectors. This is a truly unique experience.



The Pavilion

The Pavilion is the perfect place to restore your energy at any time of the day. At the other end of the pool, The Pavilion provides a stunning view over the stables and paddocks where the Selmans' thoroughbred Arabian horses parade. The Selman






Vanessa Branson and Howell James' unique boutique hotel in the Marrakech medina combines the indulgence of a hip hotel with the heritage of seven traditional courtyard houses and one of the finest contemporary art collections in Morocco. A riot of colour, the décor is Moroccan with both contemporary and retro twists.

The hotel's labyrinth of suites, bedrooms and public spaces retain a special intimacy yet the hotel is now able to cater for 65 guests across the main building (23 bedrooms/suites, which includes a two bedroom private house and a three bedroom private house) and a newly-refurbished five-bedroom annex..

The secret of El Fenn lies in the contrast between its large scale grandeur and its plentiful private corners. Guests tend to stay cocooned within the ancient walls, whether immersing themselves in the tranquillity of three main courtyards filled with bougainvillea and birdsong, or curling up with a book on a sofa in one of the many hidden nooks found throughout the hotel. The hammam and spa are popular spots in which to relax. Among the many ways it sets itself apart from other hotels is the stunning 7,000 sq.ft (650m2) roof terrace with views of the Koutoubia mosque and the snow-capped Atlas Mountains beyond. Accessed by a staircase or the lift, it is the place for a delicious breakfast, a long lunch, or a drink with friends. Guests can expect luxury on a sumptuous scale, thanks to the meticulous renovation and interior design by El Fenn's general manager, Willem Smit. Creating comforts of the rooms include spacious seating areas, marble baths, dual sinks and monsoon showers, while some of the 650 sq ft suites feature hand-stitched camel leather floors, open wood fireplaces, plunge pools and private terraces. Owner Vanessa Branson has built up an extensive private collection of works by contemporary artists over the years. Much of it now hangs in El Fenn where it is considered to be one of the most important collections of contemporary art in Morocco. With Ms Branson's art works seen throughout the public spaces and bedrooms, guests may find themselves dining under a stunning chandelier created by Francis Upritchard or sleeping beside a series of ink studies by Antony Gormley.

So many El Fenn guests wished to replicate the El Fenn style, which Branson had created with her business partner, Howell James and Willem Smit, that, in November 2015, the former lofty restaurant and theatre was transformed into a roomy concept store-cum-bar and restaurant. The interior of the new space has a classic English Old School vibe, complete with vintagestyle lampshades, and there is still space for 35 diners and more drinkers to prop up the bar. Adorning the walls currently are works from Casablanca based Cultures Interface.



Co-curating the concept store's collection, with general manager Willem Smit, is one of the biggest names in model making and fashion, ex-Ford Models, Paul Rowland. The store stocks - from new designers - a wonderful range of vintage-style clothes, many with a Moroccan vibe and an urban twist. Also on offer are vintage bags, accessories, beautiful jewellery, coffee table books, perfumes, and home accessories from the finest bed linens to the best of Fez pottery. Welcoming day shoppers and hotel guests alike, El Fenn's shopping experience removes the need for haggling in the souks.





Those who wish to explore find that El Fenn's location beside the Bab El Ksour gate also allows instant access to both ancient and modern Marrakech. The bustle of Djemma El Fna square and the souks are just a threeminute walk away, while the shops, bars and restaurants of Gueliz and Hivernage are a five-minute taxi ride.

In 2005 Vanessa Branson founded the Marrakech Biennale. With a thriving visual art, literature and film programme, it has become internationally recognised. Last year she was awarded the Royal distinction of Officer of the Order of Ouissam Alaouite, in recognition of the contribution she has made to the Moroccan cultural scene and, in particular, for her efforts in establishing Marrakech as a richly diverse and eclectic platform for the arts.



HASSAN II MOSQUE CASABLANCA

Casablanca

Though not as atmospheric as other Moroccan cities, Casablanca is the best representation of the modern nation. This is where money is being made, where young Moroccans come to seek their fortunes and where business and the creative industries prosper. The number of construction projects currently under way here is simply extraordinary - major redevelopments include those at Pl Mohammed V and the Parc de la Ligue Arabe, and new public buildings include the Grand Théâtre de Casablanca. HASSAN II MOSQUE

Guided tours are possible from Saturday to Thursday, at 9:00, 10:00, 11:00, 12:00 or 14:00, or daily at 14:30 in the summer. o Guided tours cost 120 dirhams (around \$12). o Visitors need to respect a strict dress code: no shoes, covered knees and shoulders.

It all started in the mid-1980s when the King of Morocco, Hassan II, acknowledged the important lack of architectural and historical landmarks in Casablanca. The city had covered herself in apartment buildings, offices and headquarters, but had very little cultural life, or anything to offer to a rapidly growing tourism flow. The Hassan II Mosque was indeed built on a promontory over the Atlantic Ocean, the seabed being visible from the glass floor in the great hall. The construction, however, wasn't free of controversy: much of the \$750 million needed to build the Mosque was financed directly from Moroccans themselves. Every single family was obligated to pay a set minimum amount, in exchange for a certificate of donation. The Mosque, at completion in 1993, became Morocco's largest, and the 7th largest in the whole world.

Its minaret, at 210 metres high, is the highest in the world. The entire Mosque's complex covers over 22 acres of land: the main hall can welcome around 25,000 worshipers while over 80,000 people can gather on the outside grounds. Interestingly enough, only the stained glass and chandeliers were imported from Italy. All the other materials, like cedar, marble and granite, were brought from different regions of the country.

The truth is, I will gladly go back again if only to step into this spectacular building. The guided tour was fascinating, and very informative for Islamic neophytes. The traditions related to prayers and the Islamic culture were very well explained and set the tone for the rest of my time in Morocco.



HASSAN TOWER, RABAT, MOROCCO

There's a clean central beach, an intact and evocative kasbah, and an attractive walled medina that is far less touristy than those in other large cities. All in all, the city is a good choice for a short sojourn.

Discover Rabat



HASSAN TOWER

Guarded at all times by elaborately dressed royal guards and fez-topped security personnel, Rabat's two most visited sites stand opposite each other along the magnificent Bou Regreg river. Hassan Tower (or Tour Hassan) and the Mausoleum of Mohammed V are two of Morocco's most mystical places: one is an incomplete project of majestic proportions and the other stands as a masterpiece of modern Moroccan architecture, holding inside the grand tombs of past kings. Wander through the ruins of columns and enter the ornamental grandeur that is the exquisite mausoleum to discover a part of Moroccan history that will forever remain incomplete. It was the beginning of the 12th century when the great Sultan Yacoub al Mansour ordered the construction of the Hassan Tower and its adjoining mosque in Rabat. Having already planned the creation of the iconic Koutoubia Mosque in Marrakech and planned the restoration of the ancient Udayas Kasbah, the sultan now moved on to another impressive project: the building of the world's tallest minaret and largest mosque.

Construction thus began in 1195 with the intention of erecting a minaret that would reach 86 meters (260 feet) in height, and a mosque large enough to accommodate 20,000 worshipers. This grand project was designed to be centerpiece of the celebration of the sultan's victory over the Spanish Christians at Alarcos but the sultan's death in 1199 led to a dramatic halt in construction which was never picked up thereafter.

What was left was a minaret standing 44 meters (145 feet) tall and about 200 columns that would have sustained the impressive projected mosque.

An earthquake in 1755 further damaged the incomplete site, tearing down some of the central columns of the mosque. Most of these, however, were restored and help to portray the intended dimensions of the original project. The imposing minaret also survived the earthquake and dominates almost every view of the magnificent city of Rabat.

A MODERN MASTERPIECE

Just across these unfinished ruins stands the striking Mausoleum of Mohammed V. Built in the 1950s and inaugurated six years after the death of Mohammed V in 1961, the structure is considered today a masterpiece of

modern Alouite dynasty architecture. Its seemingly plain exterior of white walls and typical green-tiled roof contrasts deeply with the elaborately ornamented interior.

Morocco's exquisite traditional craftsmanship is one of the main features guarded within the walls of the mausoleum, with magnificent zellij mosaics rising from marble floors to a ceiling of hand-carved cedar wood and gold leaf.

Of course, the main feature of mausoleum are the glorious tombs of King Mohammed V (the grandfather of

Morocco's current king) and his two sons. Set on the ground floor of the mausoleum, the white onyxcarved tombs are guarded by royal guards and fez-topped (that hat and not the city of Fez) security agents and can be admired from an interior balcony which surrounds

them.

This magnificent site is open daily for all visitors and non-Muslims are welcome to enter the holy mausoleum and even the small mosque next door. The royal guards, who are mounted on horses and dressed in an elaborate uniform, stand at the main entrance and are also usually open to being photographed. Visitors are simply asked to dress respectfully and avoid coming between noon and 2pm, when the mausoleum closes for midday prayers in the mosque.



DAR AL-MAKHZEN PALACE

Located in the centre of Rabat, Morocco, the Dar al-Makhzen Palace, also called Palais Royal, is the official residence of His Majesty King Mohammed VI of Morocco and his family. It should not be confused with the Dar el Makhzen in Tangier, Morocco. Alaouite sultans and kings have had a residence in the Moroccan capital since Muhammad al-Nafs al-Zakiyya reigned in the 700s. The beautifully designed palace now standing was initially built in 1864 as a replacement for the old palace that had been built by Sultan Muhammad IV. It is situated on a parade ground called a mechouar which is used for large public gatherings. A mosque, accommodations for the Royal Guard, a cookery school, a ground floor library and the Collège Royal. The latter educates senior members of the Moroccan Royal Family. The library contains the manuscript collection of King Hassan II. Immaculate gardens are on the ground of the palace, as well. These gardens were designed with both French and Arab influences.

Morocco began negotiations for its independence from France in 1956, and after independence had been declared, the Dar al-Makhzen Palace remained as the main and working palace for the King.

As the official home and working palace for the Moroccan Royal Family, it has played host to the wedding of King Mohammed to Salma Bennati (now Princess Lalla Salma); it was also the birthplace of the late King Hassan II who reigned from 1961 to his death in 1999. His son now reigns as King Mohammed VI. Unlike many of its counterparts in Europe, Dar al-Makhzen Palace the is not open to visitors. However, those who have been in Rabat have said that you can get decently close to the Palace before the guards begin to get uneasy and ask you to leave.



KASBAH OF THE UDAYAS


Rabat's historic citadel occupies the site of the original ribat(fortressmonastery) that gave the city its name. Predominately residential, its narrow streets are lined with whitewashed houses - most of which were built by Muslim refugees from Spain. There are scenic views over the river and ocean from the Plateforme du Sémaphore at its highest point, and the attractive Andalusian Gardens at its southern edge are a popular relaxation and meeting point for locals. The most dramatic entry to the kasbah is through the enormous Almohad gate of Bab Oudaia, built in 1195. Its location, facing the heart of the city and just outside the original palace, made it more ceremonial than defensive and the gateway is elaborately decorated with a series of carved arches. These days, it is only occasionally open so most visitors enter through a much smaller nearby gateway. Inside, the main street, Rue Jamaa, runs straight through the kasbah to the Plateforme du Sémaphore. About 200m ahead on the left is the oldest mosque in Rabat, built in the 10th century and restored in the 18th with funds donated by an English pirate known as Ahmed el Inlisi, one of the feared Sallee Rovers.



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
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BAB MANSOUR LALEUJ, MEKNES, MOROCCO



Quieter and smaller than its grand neighbour Fez, Meknès feels rather overshadowed and receives fewer visitors than it should. It's more laid-back with less hassle, yet still has all the winding narrow medina streets and grand buildings that it warrants as an imperial city and one-time home of the Moroccan sultanate. Sultan Moulay Ismail, the architect of Meknès' glory days, might be a little disgruntled at the city's current modesty, but visitors will find much to be enchanted by. Remnants of no less than three sets of fortifications, ingeniously incorporated into the city's road networks, make it clear how important this city once was. The king's tomb sits at the heart of what remains of the original imperial city, flanked by an almighty royal granary, the magnificent Bab el-Mansour – the likes of which even Fez can't compete with - and Pl el-Hedim, a local mini-me of Marrakesh's popular Djemaa el-Fna.

Discover Meknez



MEDERSA BOU INANIA

Opposite the Grande Mosquée, the Medersa Bou Inania is typical of the exquisite interior design that distinguishes Merenid monuments. It was completed in 1358 by Bou Inan, after whom a more lavish medersa in Fez is also named. This medersa is a good display of the classic Moroccan decorative styles – the zellij base, delicate stucco midriff and carved cedar-wood ceiling. You can climb onto the roof for views of the green-tiled roof and minaret of the Grande Mosquée nearby. Students aged eight to 10 years once lived two to a cell on the ground floor, while older students and teachers lived on the 1st floor in the luxury of private rooms. On the right when you enter is the school room with a deep mihrab for natural amplification.



BAB EL MANSOUR

The focus of Pl el-Hedim is the huge gate of Bab el-Mansour, the grandest of all imperial Moroccan gateways. The gate is well preserved with lavish (if faded) zellij and inscriptions across the top. It was completed by Moulay Ismail's son, Moulay Abdallah, in 1732. The two white columns either side of the bab are Corinthian marble, plundered from a Marrakesh palace. They were acquired by Moulay Ismail during his lifetime but only added to the babby Monlay Abdallah after his father's death. Along the top of the gate, the Arabic inscription extols Bab el-Mansour's virtues with a confidence befitting of the king. It reads: 'I am the most beautiful gate in Morocco. I'm like the moon in the sky. Property and wealth are written on my front.



PLACE EL-HEDIM

The heart of the Meknès medina is Pl el-Hedim, the large square facing Bab el-Mansour. Before Moulay Ismail swept through town a kasbah stood on this spot, but once the bab was erected the king ordered for it to be demolished in favour of a broad plaza from which the gate could be better admired. Originally used for royal announcements and public executions, it's a good place to sit and watch the world go by.

There's definitely parallels to be drawn between this square and its grand cousin, Marrakesh's Djemaa el-Fna. The Meknasi version, however, has a lot more of a local flavour. There's always something going on – kids playing football, musicians drawing crowds, and promenading families treating their toddlers to spins in electric toy cars. Sadly you'll also sometimes see

shackled monkeys captured from the nearby Middle Atlas, providing local entertainment.

One edge is lined with cafes and restaurants; behind these is an excellent, covered produce market.



Fez

An ancient breeding ground for scholars and artisans, imams and gourmands – Fez is a supremely self-confident city with a historical and cultural lineage that beguiles visitors. And there is something intangibly raw about a place where 70,000 people still choose to live in the maelstrom of a medina so dark, dense and dilapidated that it remains the world's largest car-free urban area. Donkeys cart goods down the warren of alleyways as they have done since medieval times, and ruinous pockets loom around every corner – though a government drive to restore Fès el-Bali to its former glory is spurring changes.

Discover Fez



MEDERSA BOU INANIA

A short walk down Talaa Kebira from Bab Bou Jeloud, the Medersa Bou Inania is the finest of Fez' theological colleges. It was built by the Merenid sultan Bou Inan between 1351 and 1357, and has been impressively restored with elaborate zellij(tiles) and carved plaster, beautiful cedar mashrabiyyas (lattice screens) and massive brass entrance doors. Whereas most medersas just have a simple prayer hall, the Bou Inania is unusual in that it hosts a complete mosque. The mihrab (niche facing Mecca) has a particularly fine ceiling and onyx marble columns. It's thought that the medersa required a larger-scale mosque because there was none other nearby at the time; it includes a beautiful green-tiled minaret.

CHEFCHAOUEN

Beautifully perched beneath the raw peaks of the Rif, Chefchaouen is one of the prettiest towns in Morocco, an artsy, blue-washed mountain village that feels like its own world. While tourism has definitely taken hold, the balance between ease and authenticity is just right. The old medina is a delight of Moroccan and Andalucian influence with red-tiled roofs, bright-blue buildings and narrow lanes converging on busy Plaza Uta el-Hammam and its restored kasbah. Long known to backpackers for the easy availability of kif (cannabis), the town has rapidly gentrified and offers a range of quality accommodation, good food, lots to do and no hassles to speak of, making it a strong alternative to a hectic multicity tour. This is a great place to relax, explore and take day trips to the cool green hills.


MEDINA OF FEZ

Founded in the 9th century and home to the oldest university in the world, Fez reached its height in the 13th– 14th centuries under the Marinids, when it replaced Marrakesh as the capital of the kingdom. The urban fabric and the principal monuments in the medina – madrasas, fondouks, palaces, residences, mosques and fountains date from this period. Although the political capital of Morocco was transferred to Rabat in 1912, Fez has retained its status as the country's cultural and spiritual centre.

The Medina of Fez preserves, in an ancient part comprising numerous monumental buildings, the memory of the capital founded by the Idrisid dynasty between 789 and 808 A.D. The original town was comprised of two large fortified quarters separated by the Fez wadi: the banks of the Andalous and those of the Kaïrouanais. In the 11th century, the Almoravids reunited the town within a sole rampart and, under the dynasty of the Almohads (12th and 13th centuries), the original town (Fez el-bali) already grew to its present-day size. Under the Merinids (13th to 15th centuries), a new town (Fez Jedid) was founded (in 1276) to the west of the ancient one (Fez El-Bali). It contains the royal palace, the army headquarters, fortifications and residential areas. At that time, the two entities of the Medina of Fez evolve in symbiosis forming one of the largest Islamic metropolis's representing a great variety of architectural forms and urban landscapes. They include a considerable number of religious, civil and military monuments that brought about a multi-cultural society.

This architecture is characterised by construction techniques and decoration developed over a period of more than ten centuries, and where local knowledge and skills are interwoven with diverse outside inspiration (Andalousian, Oriental and African). The Medina of Fez is considered as one of the most extensive and best conserved historic towns of the Arab-Muslim world. The unpaved urban space conserves the majority of its original functions and attribute. It not only represents an outstanding architectural, archaeological and urban heritage, but also transmits a life style, skills and a culture that persist and are renewed despite the diverse effects of the evolving modern societies.





B etween 1880 and 1930, following the international trade liberalisation, some prominent citizens of Fez left their town to settle in Western metropolises such as Manchester, Barcelona, Lyon, Marseille, etc. Their trade activities engendered significant cultural changes not only at the level of the historical city but also at the level of Morocco in general.

The layout of houses, the interior design, the dress code and the gastronomy developed rapidly and gave birth to a new life style. The Western "contemporary" art combined with the ancestral traditions of Fez and bred new forms of civilisation that are clearly reflected in what Riad Fes is today.

Ben Slimane, a famous judge and intellectual from Fez, started to rebuild a forsaken neighbourhood of the city. He conceded a lot of the land to the prominent person and tradesman Lahlou who laid the foundation of the main building of Riad Fes at the beginning of 1900.

Other buildings that date back to 17th and 18th centuries shelter the Riad Fes restaurant and the Prince's quarters.

In 1999, the SEFRIOUI family (architect and hoteliers) purchased progressively the different pavilions of Riad Fes and began their restoration in a full respect of Fez traditions and arts.

At present, the establishment of this place offers all the facilities and services of a Deluxe hotel in a traditional and comfortable setting.





Gultural Gadget AND TIPS TO SUCCEED

YOUR VISIT

Today, the majority of the population identifies as Berber or Arab and the country's official language is Arabic. Morocco is a Muslim country, with 99% of its population identifying as Sunni Muslim, but religious minorities are widely respected.

Moroccans are a very welcoming and tolerant people towards different cultures, ideas and ways of life. This doesn't mean they don't have strong beliefs and cultural norms – and you should definitely avoid offending those at all costs. Things that may be commonplace in your native culture can be misinterpreted when discussing culture and etiquette in Morocco.

some details that you should keep in mind when visiting Morocco, for example, with the way of dressing in cosmopolitan cities, such as Marrakesh, Rabat and Fez, the dress code is more relaxed and common to see women wear short-sleeve tops and knee-length skirts and men often wear sleeveless t-shirts. If you are ever unsure about what to wear, keep in mind that the best guide to knowing what is appropriate is to note how the locals dress and follow their lead. But if you visit rural areas you should always attempt to cover body parts considered "private". For women, this can mean covering the arms (or at least the shoulders) and the knees up. For men, it requires covering up the shoulders and above the knee. Moroccans tend to be more formal when greeting than Westerners. When you meet someone for the first time, it is common to inquire about marital status, children, as well as the health and well-being of one's family. Moroccans typically greet with a handshake and sometimes two kisses (starting with the left cheek) but this only occurs when the two people greeting are of the same sex. In any greeting that takes place between a man and a woman, the woman should extend her hand first if she wants to be greeted – if she does not do this, a man should bow his head in greeting.

Public displays of affection in Morocco should also be kept to a minimum, as this is a conservative culture.

Any gesture you make in Morocco should be done with your right hand (yes, even if you're traditionally a lefty!). The left hand is considered impure and is saved for bathroom duties and cleaning chores. All greetings, dining manners and other gestures should be done with your right hand. It is also impolite in Morocco to point at someone with your index finger to motion them towards you. You should instead beckon someone by placing your palm downward and sweeping your hand towards yourself.

If you visit a mosque and you are not Muslim, Unfortunately you are not allowed to enter most mosques in Morocco. The only exceptions to this rule are the ancient Tin Mal Mosque in the High Atlas, the Great Mosque at Smara in the Western Sahara, the courtyard of the imperial sanctuary-mosque of Moulay Ismail in Meknes, and the Hassan II Mosque in Casablanca. If you happen to be invited into someone's home, know you will have an amazing experience. However there are also some rules of etiquette to be followed. First, it's important to always make sure that your spouse was also invited with you. Some Moroccan families may be more conservative and thus not entertain mixed-sex groups or may organize separate dining areas for women and men.

As soon as you enter the home, you should remove your shoes and leave them by the door (your host will let you know if such a formality is not needed). It is also a good custom to come bearing gifts. These can typically be a treat such as pastries, figs, dates, nuts or fresh juices. Fresh flowers can also make a great gift and you can also consider bringing a smaller present for the children of the household. Avoid bringing alcohol (unless you know that your host drinks and exactly what they enjoy) and never bring hot dishes.

Once dinner is ready, expect to be seated on a floor mat around a knee-high round table with one communal dish in the middle, or on couches around a large round table. Before the meal is served, a wash basin may be brought to the table: hold your hands over it while the water is poured and then dry them on the towel provided. When your host starts eating you may begin as well. If you are eating from a communal dish, keep to the triangle of food immediately in front of you. It is custom to use your right hand to eat however if you are left handed it typically is not an issue or faux pas. Expect more food to be offered to you once you stop eating. It is polite to refuse the first time and then take a small portion upon a second food offering. If you are completely full, simply pat your stomach and shake your head while saying "La, shukrran" ("No, thank you"). Do not be surprised if your host continues to push you to eat, it is a sign of respect and generosity.

Amazing Moroce

About tipping, in Morocco is customary, so you will be expected to leave a few dirham in a number of places during your travels through the country. Although there is no standard amount you should always leave in different establishments and different circumstances, we've covered the most basic rules of thumb to help you out. In all cases, tipping is a very emotive attitude and it's often based on a personal perception of the quality of the service provided. Even though it is customary to tip in Morocco, how generous you are can be left up to you and to your satisfaction.

With respect to the woman tourist, there is no doubt that for traveling in Morocco it is different than traveling in a Western country. In Morocco, gender roles are much more defined and the traditional views of a patriarchal society are quite prominent which means women will have to take extra precautions when discovering the colorful streets of Morocco. Women may experience catcalling and more attention from members of the opposite sex, the best way to deal with this is to completely ignore them. Should you feel uncomfortable at any time, promptly alert the nearest police officer for assistance.

Women are generally expected to dress more modestly, not engage in drinking or smoking in public, and avoid physical contact with men. Although this code of behavior is now more relaxed in big cities such as Rabat, Marrakesh and Fez, it is important to follow it in rural Morocco. Pay attention to the Moroccan women around you to gain helpful clues as to what is acceptable. Visiting women are not expected to dress as Moroccans do, but a little bit of respect can go a long way.

We hope these basic culture and etiquette tips will help you have an enjoyable time in this amazing country without worry!

This desert camp is situated in the south eastern of Morocco. It is a Berber trademark which developed into a set of tents serving as traditional and comfortable accommodation for its guests. Offering a starting the night with a tasty berber "wisky", and followed by a pleasant and leisurely conversation with one of our hosts, the night looked promising. The bivouac offers a splendid atmosphere of desert night life for peace seekers, desert lovers, stars followers, differente cultural experience, and why not? For the music lovers you the hosts will delight you with beautiful berber songs and one or another friend who joins with an tipical instrument and makes the night something special.

The Camp occupies an area of about 500 m² amid sand dunes. Tents are set up in the traditional Berber shape; enabling guests explore what the local Berbers make for shelter. There are currently 12 tents for accommodation, in addition to a restaurant tent, and bathrooms. All tents make a circle around the bivouac yard, which is often exploited for different usages. Each of the tents is illuminated by electric lamps in and outside the tents.

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
